Type in www.Myspace. com, log in, click "skip ad," check messages, check comments then refresh to see if you got new ones even though you just checked them less than a minute ago.

This is the routine of a typical Myspace addict, and sadly, relates to much of the student population here at Chatsworth High. Although it is well known that Myspace is a common addiction among us teens, it has also been proven to be a dangerous one, raising the attention of parents and administrators.

Thus, a PTSA meeting was held to give parents and students advice on how to keep safe while on the internet, particularly on Myspace.

Ms. Hazel, from the District Attorney's office, was the leader of the presentation. She gave examples of real-life, worst-case scenarios of an online friendship gone wrong, as well as listing to parents some signs that may show their child is having a sus-

picious online relationship and what can be done about it.

"Imagine driving down a major freeway, such as the 118, and seeing a billboard with your picture, name, hobbies and phone number on it for everyone to see. That is exactly what you are doing when you are posting your information online, for the world to see," said Hazel.

With approximately 10,000 profiles belonging to students here at Chatsworth High School, El Camino Real High School, and Granada High School, several harassment incidents have been reported, and even tried, causing parents to raise their eyebrows upon the safety of their child when they are surfing the net and interacting on sites such as Myspace.

"I go on Myspace everyday to talk to my friends but I think its really weird when strangers try to talk to me, because I don't even know who they are," said sophomore Kareem Jamal.

Late Kids To Sacrifice Saturdays

Chronically tardy students may soon be forced to serve a two-hour Saturday detention for their tardies, according to a new tardy policy that will go into effect in the spring semester.

The Chatsworth Leadership Council developed this new policy after analyzing several tardy policies from Local District One and District Two high schools.

Students will no longer be sent to K-78 for being late, but will instead be assigned two hours of Saturday detention on their sixth tardy. Only students with referral forms are going to be sent to K-78 for disciplinary problems. Parents will be receiving a letter or call home from K-78 after their child's third tardy. Teachers will still be permitted to have their own tardy punishments such as taking away points.

After serving their detention, students start off with a clean slate and would not receive another detention sentence until their next sixth tardy, and would receive a four-hour detention on their third detention.

If the student does not attend a Saturday detention, they will receive a four-hour assignment along with loss of student privileges until the detention time is served.

If the tardy problem continues, the School Attendance Review Team Process (SART) would be initiated, resulting in severe legal proceedings to try and solve the problem. This may include finding an alternative placement, referring the parent/guardian, or student to court. This new tardy policy would hopefully reduce school wide tardiness.

For Tyra Smith, graduating was the most important thing in the world. Last summer, she accomplished that with the rest of the CHS class of 2006. On Jan. 8, 2007 she was laid to rest.

According to preliminary details coming from her friends and teachers, she was taken to the hospital on Dec. 21 "because she wasn't feeling good," said her friend, sophomore Diamond Matthews. Two days later she died. She was 18.

"My grandmother told me it was from a blood clot in one of her lungs," said Matthews, whose grandmother was close to Tyra's family.

"She was a very sweet young lady, she was always smiling," said Mrs. Greenberg, her counselor. "She came to my office every day to make sure she was going to graduate. She knew she was, she just wanted to hear it.

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Is There a Doctor in C-House? Why, Yes

After 11 years of research and dedication, a 250-page dissertation, and 3 years at one of the "10 worst schools in the state of California," our principal, formerly known as Mr. Davis, can at last call himself Dr Davis

On May 11, 2007, at the University of Southern California, Davis will officially become a doctor of education (EdD) when he receives his diploma. While working full-time as an educator and working towards his doctorate degree over a period of 11 years, the University granted Davis time extensions so that he could complete his higher education.

In order to get a doctorate degree, Davis had to complete a dissertation, an in-depth research paper on a specific topic relevant to his educational leadership degree.

After three years of successfully carrying out his responsibilities as principal of Sun Valley Middle School, Davis could finally begin work on his dissertation which is "an analysis of how to take a school that's failing and make it successful even to the point of doubling performance.

Indeed, test scores at Sun Valley improved: "In one year test scores were up 51 points" and "in three years they were up 131 points," Davis said.

Davis started writing his dissertation in July 2005, when he began working as principal of Chatsworth High. It took him years to carry out his research and gather information, and one and a half years to complete his dissertation.

Principal Davis' dissertation is currently being used to set an example for other educators to follow and includes methods that are now part of educational research.

Davis said the experience of earning his doctorate "makes me more introspective."

Oh, The Weather Outside Is Frightfully Odd

"Why is it so cold?" "Why is it so hot?" Why is it so windy?" These are the questions that have been on students' minds lately. This winter, students have had to deal with very harsh weather conditions. It is difficult to predict what the day is going to be like, because it's cold in the morning, and then hot in the afternoon, or vise versa. The past few weeks we've had temperatures between 85 degrees to almost 30 degrees, just within days. Many theories are believed to be the solution.

According to MSNBC, an increase in greenhouse gasses

can explain why the weather in the U.S. has been so extreme. The greenhouse gas that affects the weather is carbon dioxide, which is released from burning fossil fuels. All of these burning fossil fuels from running cars are contributing to a natural greenhouse effect around the earth, trapping in heat. Since the beginning of the industrial revolution, carbon dioxide in the atmosphere has increased by thirty percent, helping to make 2006 the warmest year on record so far.

Another reason why the weather is extreme is because of recent El Ninos, which are Pacific Ocean patterns that affect weather by preventing arctic blasts across the United States.

Southern Californians are already used to weather having its ups and downs. For example, on January 9, Chatsworth had a high of 81 degrees, which is normal for us here in Southern California. Just a couple of days later, on January 13, we had a high of 50 degrees, and a low of 27 degrees, cold enough for snow, in California!

The weather across the United States is very different from our temperatures here in Chatsworth. The coldest day of the month in Chatsworth was January 13, with a high of 50 degrees, and a low of 35 degrees.

If you were to relocate yourself and travel to Columbus, Ohio, the coldest day of

January was Jan. 25, with a high of 25 degrees and a low of 15 degrees. In Nashville, Tennessee, the coldest day in January was Jan. 23, with 39 degrees as the high, and 28 degrees as the low. Augusta, Maine's coldest day this month was Jan. 17, at a freezing 6 degrees, and a low of –6 degrees. So the next time you complain about it being 'cold,' remember you aren't even getting half of it.

Not sure if you need mittens or suntan lotion? Well, there are lots of things you can have handy just in case. You may want to keep a coat and an umbrella in your locker to be prepared for the cold later in the day. For windy weather, it is recommended that you wear Chap Stick. Lotion is something important to remember on a cold or windy day because if your hands get too dry, they can crack, which can be quite painful. Guvs usually don't wear lotion, but there is lotion that doesn't smell, and it should be worn to help you in the wind.

Starving for Perfection Proves Fatal for Some Models

Anorexia nervosa is not a new concept to the world or high school students in general. Many women, as well as men, have suffered and died from this deadly disease. So it was no surprise to hear that yet another model died from complications due to anorexia. Ana Carolina Reston died in Brazil weighing 88 pounds at 5' 8". Doctors state this is the normal weight for a five feet tall, 12 year-old.

Reston's death followed the death of Uruguayan model Luisel Ramos from heart failure. Both models ate close to nothing preceding their deaths. Reston died after going on a diet that consisted of only apples and tomatoes, according to the Herald Sun. Ramos passed away after consuming only lettuce leaves and Diet Coke for close to 3 months. Reston died at 21, while Ramos perished at 22.

So what exactly is happening behind this awful situation? And what do students here at CHS feel about this? "That's

horrible that women do that. They should feel beautiful and love their body. If they don't love themselves, then no one will," said junior Dominique

Why do these beautiful girls feel the need to starve themselves? Some state the modeling industry is to blame. "The image of modeling, yes, but there are many other kinds of modeling like plus size models," said senior Shayna Isenburg.

Some also think that the pressure to stay thin comes from not only modeling and advertisements, but from the expectations from the men around them. However, some disagree. "In my perspective guys are going for the healthy-looking girls. I have overheard many guys say that anorexic-looking girls are not attractive and [that] they prefer girls who are healthy and not afraid to eat," said Isenburg.

In addition, 10 guvs here at CHS and 10 females were shown two images from "Glamour" magazine, one an ultra skinny model and another photo of the same model that

had been brushed up to add a few pounds. Nine out of 10 males, as well as females, preferred the photo-shopped model to the naturally rail-thin model.

Newsweek's Jessica Bennett states, "Genes load the gun and an environment pulls the trigger." So more aspects come into play than one may imagine. Advertisements showing unrealistically skinny girls wearing popular clothes, and families and peers that pressure children to stay thin, all make an impact on young children, especially females and those predisposed to anorexia nervosa. More than we think comes into play.

Reston's mother had this to say: "Take care of your children... no money is worth the life of your child, not even the most famous child, not even the most famous (fashion) brand is worth this."

Why are we pressuring our youth to be thin and unhealthy? Maybe we should pour the same energy into making people want to be healthy and happy as we do making them feel they need to starve to stay skinny.

Vaccine For Sexually Transmitted Infection Also Cuts Cancer Risk

New HPV vaccines are being given in U.S hospitals to prevent infection from four strains of HPV.

HPV, the human papillomavirus, is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the United States, with about 6.2 million cases diagnosed annually according to kaiseredu.org. The name of the vaccine is called Gardasil and is given in a series of three doses.

Kaiseredu.org states that the vaccine is recommended for girls and women between the ages of 9 and 26. The vaccine protects against four types of strains, two of which cause 70 percent of cancer cases, and the other two, which cause 90 percent of genital wart cases. There are more than one hundred strains of HPV. In 2005,

there were 500,000 new cases of cervical cancer worldwide, and 260,000 women died from the cancer. A majority of the women were in developing countries where forms of tests and prevention aren't very strong. "I think it is a good thing because even though it is a preventative vaccine, it is a good precaution to take," said junior Melissa Chua.

The site also states that the vaccine does not prevent against all strain types of HPV. This makes Pap tests mandatory for the detection of precancerous cells because if detected early, cervical cancer is highly treatable. The vaccine is highly accepted by gynecologists and physicians, but is taken voluntarily.

The cost of the vaccine for three doses is about \$360 but most likely medical insurance will cover the costs.

Keeping the computer in a common room, knowing online acronyms, checking buddy lists regularly for strange screen

names, and knowing your child's emails and passwords are all suggested ways to keep tabs on their safety.

Little program disks were also being sold for \$5 that would scan the computer for phrases that would suggest any suspicious activity and gave the parents the option to delete them. Students were informed as well, to always report suspicious activity, to never meet a stranger in person, and to only converse with and add those that they have met in real life while setting their profiles on "private" or "friends only."

FX's newest television series "Dirt," which premiered Jan. 2nd, could have ultimately proved to be the sister show of "Nip/Tuck," but unfortunately lacked pizzazz in all aspects.

Courtney Cox stars as Lucy Spiller, a ruthless editor of two Hollywood celebrity gossip magazines, who is always on the run for tabloid news. Along with her schizophrenic paparazzo partner Don Konkey (Ian Hart), Spiller goes to immoral extremes for scandals of the entertainment industry. Perhaps all this is due to her socially disturbed personal life, in which her only friend seems to be her manic photographer.

Holt McClaren (Josh Stewart), a B-list celebrity, and his girlfriend Julia Mallory (Laura Allen), one of the most famous women in Hollywood, trade off a friend's secret pregnancy in exchange for publicity. Spiller then blackmails McClaren into spilling more secrets for "Dirt" so that she can gain profits for the company before her boss Gibson Horne (Timothy Bottoms) fires her.

A man sells his soul for fame, Spiller finds sexual pleasure in celebrity gossip, a pregnant actress overdoses in her bathtub, and the photographer hallucinates. Although "Dirt" sounds like the perfect replica of Nip/Tuck, it's far from ideal. The acting is completely horrendous due to its bland nature. Cox may have gotten her big break in "Friends," but alone she fails to portray the roughedged Lucy Spiller. She almost makes you want to scream.

Aside from the acting,

the script is too much for 60 minutes of airtime. Death, pregnancy, drug overdose, and sex in just one episode is quite overdone. If there weren't any randomly scattered sex scenes and overrated drama, then maybe the plotline would be comprehendible. Nevertheless, Ian Hart's character keeps the series going with his schizophrenic obsession with cats.
